Dr. Susan Blair brings 36 years of diverse clinical occupational therapy experience, spanning NICU, palliative care, rehabilitation, home health, and skilled nursing. A dedicated educator and mentor, she has served as a clinical staff developer and fieldwork coordinator, overseeing and mentoring over 20 occupational therapy staff. Dr. Blair is currently an Assistant Clinical Professor in the Entry Level OT Doctoral Program at Baylor University. Dr. Blair holds dual AOTA Board Certifications in Physical Rehabilitation and Gerontology. She has authored textbook chapters and journal articles, including Influencing Perception of Frailty Risk in Urban and Rural Older Adults (Physical & Occupational Therapy in Geriatrics, 2023) and Investigating the Efficacy of an Online Multigenerational Awareness Course for Occupational Therapy Students: A Pilot Study (Open Journal of Occupational Therapy, 2025). She has also presented extensively on evidence-based practice and developed the AOTA-approved workshop Geriatric Rehabilitation for Today's Older Adults. Dr. Blair actively contributes to the Gerontology Exam for AOTA's Advanced Certification and Specialty and was appointed to the AOTA Commission on Practice in 2024.
